Mark your calendar for next week! American Experience, again, offers one of America's most distinguished historians, **Allyson Hobbs**. Professor Hobbs is an Associate Profes-

sor at Stanford University and Director of African and African American Studies. She has a reputation as a gifted storyteller and has won many teaching awards. She served on the 2018 History Pulitzer Prize Committee that awarded the Pulitzer in History to David Blight, our other AE speaker this summer.

Professor Hobbs will speak July 11-15, Monday through Friday from 10 to 11 a.m. at Voorhies Hall with two informal small group discussions on Tuesday July 12 and Thursday July 14 from 4 to 5 p.m. under the Tent.

Her book A Chosen Exile: A History of Racial Passing in American Life chronicles the stories of African Americans voluntarily exiled from their families -- and the families from them -- as they pass for white in America seeking a better life. Once separated from their families many never return for fear of their secret being found out. Her forthcoming book from Harvard Press is *Nowhere to Run: African American Travel in Twentieth Century America.* Think of the movie, Green Book, as told from the perspective of a trained historian and master storyteller.

Professor Hobbs topic list for the week is: 1. The Great Migration 2. A Chosen Exile: Racial Passing in American Life 3. Nowhere to Run: African American Travel in Twentieth Century America 4. Hamilton: The Musical and the Restaging of America's Past 5. Citizenship & Racial Identity in Contemporary America We will hear her perspectives on African American cultural history of the 19th and 20th Century, a topic not yet covered in our 18 years of AE lectures. Notes From The Assessor Submitted by Keith Hearit



Several statements the Board of Assessors often hears from leaseholders is: "I want to appeal my taxes," "my taxes are too

high," or "why did my taxes go up?" While we understand what leaseholders mean when they make these comments, they do not reflect how the Board of Assessors approaches its work.

An oft-repeated truism by assessors is that we do not hear tax appeals but valuation appeals. While it is a semantical distinction, it is an important one and quite applicable to the assessment project we have underway in Bay View.

Like many of you, before I became interested in how assessment works, the only number I tracked was my taxes (and I lumped in all the taxes and associated fees into one category and called them taxes). But the real question you should ask is not: "what are my taxes?" but instead is "What is my assessed value?"

This is because taxes are apportioned based on a millage rate. A millage rate is a fixed dollar amount multiplied against an assessed value. In most cases, it is an amount per \$1000 of assessed value, which then is calculated to compute taxes.

In other words, since the millage rate is the same for everyone, going forward the value about which you should be most concerned is your assessed (or market) value. Our Assessment Advisor, Ed VanderVries, has been working in Bay View for much of the past year to aid us in setting assessed values for cottages. This work is still ongoing—and will be shared with you in your Notice of Assessment mailed to you next spring.

In the future, should you decide to "appeal your taxes," you should recognize that your actual

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task is to appeal your assessed value. How are assessed values calculated? Assessors draw primarily from four items when determining market values. They are the location of your cottage, its square footage, the building class, and the effective age. Sales are used as well, though not in the way in which you might think. I will cover these ideas in more detail in a subsequent column – or you may attend one of our upcoming town halls.

As to a few friendly reminders . . . If you are interested in learning more about the changes for 2023 to the apportionment of taxes in Bay View, the Board of Assessors has two more town hall's scheduled for this summer. The first is on Saturday, July 16, and is part of the annual Bay View Town Hall; the second occurs again on Friday, July 29. The content of each BoA town hall is the same, so you only need to attend one.

DAVID W. BLIGHT, Yale Professor of American History and 2019 Pulitzer Prize-winning author of *Frederick Douglass: Prophet of Freedom* returns to Bay View again this July, thanks to a generous private donation. His lectures last summer were a terrific hit. Bay View really loved him – and David Blight loved Bay View.

Blight previously scheduled two lectures this summer -- but has generously added a third very topical history lecture in light of recent events. He will lecture on the Yale Slavery Project - a deep and thorough investigation of Yale's historic involvement and associations with slavery and its aftermath, and another on James Weldon Johnson "one of the most important historical figures that most people know nothing about -- and they should." "Johnson, a man of many talents, was a key figure of the Harlem Renaissance for his poems, novel, and anthologies collecting both poems and spirituals of black culture. He wrote the lyrics for "Lift Every Voice and Sing", which later became known as the Negro National Anthem.

In his third lecture, Professor Blight will present An Historian's Reflections on U.S. Democracy in light of the January 6 Hearings. Blight will lecture, from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, July 20, 21 & 22 in Voorhies Hall with two informal "under the tent" conversations on Wednesday and Thursday from 4 to 5 p.m. Please Come!
